We are very excited to be hosting a Scanning Electron Microscope for a few weeks. The microscope, which has much magnification than greater а light microscope, has been loaned by Hitachi High-Tech in conjunction with The Natural History Museum and the Royal Microscopical Society. The school has joined the Institute for Research in Schools and obtained the microscope for a research project into fibres which will involve students and the wider public. The project was chosen because of Jedburgh's historic connections with fibre manufacturing

Developing the Young Workforce

On Monday young people from S4-S6 who expressed an interest in working in the health sector will begin participation in the NHS Borders Virtual Work Placement

This programme is an opportunity for pupils to gain SQA Level 5 Virtual Work Experience Unit. The course will be spread over 4 weeks on different days in the morning to allow for minimum disruption to senior classes.

Pupils will gain in-depth knowledge on a variety of different Services available through NHS and will demonstrate employability skills including planning, organisation, communication, reporting and presenting. They will identify skills and qualifications required for job roles within health and social care and demonstrate an awareness of the importance of procedures and confidentiality. This programme will allow pupils to gain a greater overview of the Health Sector.

On Wednesday 22nd November interested pupils from S4-S6 and all S3 pupils will have the opportunity to meet various NHS Borders representatives who will shed light on both clinical and non-clinical career options within the NHS. This presents an excellent chance for our young individuals to gain insights from professionals regarding the extensive array of roles available in the healthcare sector. Students will have the opportunity to directly engage with these experts, enquire about job responsibilities, and explore the necessary skills, attributes, as well as the different routes and pathways into the Health Sector.
